

FR. JACQUES R.I.P

What awful sadness that poor Fr. Jacques Hamel encountered preparing for morning Mass in his quiet Normandy town of Saint-Etienne-du-Rouvray. Equally for his dedicated Parishioners. That this 85 year old curate was chosen by ISIS simply because he was old and vulnerable is frightening. As Catholics we have a particular sensitivity for those who suffer innocent death. That Fr. Jaques would have died defenceless within sight of the crucifix makes his murder all the more poignant and painful to contemplate. He paid the highest price that his vocation demands. Yet the thought of having to say Mass behind locked doors is repugnant. Most Priests will prefer to face the risk. The call for more dialogue is always made at times like this. Yet the one thing that is sure about these so-called soldiers of so-called Islamic State is that they are not interested in, nor capable of any kind of dialogue. Nevertheless dialogue including building relationships across cultural boundaries has a substantial role to play. A young Muslim, ignorant of his own faith and prey to radicalisation, may come to believe that Catholics are his sworn enemy. They may know nothing of current Catholic teaching urging all of us Catholics to respect members of other faiths, and to work together on shared projects for the common good. Dialogue is about replacing false perceptions with true ones, and emphasising what is held in common. Let our daily prayers anytime that a meaningful dialogue can and will take place. In fact dialogue is so important for all of us who claim to be brothers and sisters in Jesus Christ.

THE EVER READY CHRISTIAN

We all know we are going to die. I'm not sure if knowing it has much of an influence on the way we live. We are quite right not to let it dominate or depress us, but we're quite foolish if our reluctance to face up to it leaves us entirely unprepared. Because death is inevitable, because it often takes us by surprise, because it brings us face to face with our maker, because it presents us with the prospect of eternal happiness, Jesus is warning us in this weekend's Gospel always to be prepared. He put this warning in different ways: "Be like people waiting for their master to return from the wedding feast, ready to open the door as soon as he comes" We ought to be like the battery - ever ready Christians - always alert, always prepared. How do we prepare? Well, I think our basic preparation has to be in terms of attitude. We make a conscious effort to accept our death in faith. Human death, your death, my death, is not an animal death. It's the death of a person, of one who is free. So death should be a human act. The plants and animals perish-only humans die. Death is not just something that happens to us from outside. It's something for which we consciously prepare our minds, our hearts and our lives. Death is inevitable. We must learn to accept that. Death as a "must" must become death as a "want". We all must learn to look at all reality including death, in the face. The person best placed to help us with this is Jesus Himself. He didn't look forward to death any more than we do. He cried, "Father, if it be possible let this cup pass me by". Yet His dying, when we think about it was full of faith. It was the human act - par excellence? He gathered Himself in an act of supreme trust - "Father, into your hands I commit my Spirit". This weekend Jesus is telling us to prepare for death in life's everyday situations. He is inviting us to make the most of the present. So we prepare for death by responding to present situations, and by developing a pattern of life that leaves us ready for anything. Jesus comes into our lives in the sick, the poor, the people with whom we live, the challenge of the Commandments, the choice we have between good and evil. "God", to quote Patrick Kavanagh, "is in the bits and pieces of everyday". So we are reminded that a good faithful Christian life in this world is the best preparation for next". How is your preparation going?

A wise man was known to be writing a book, but the years went by and he was still a long way from reaching the last page. One day, when he was very old, a young man asked him if he was not impatient and sad to see it uncompleted. The old man smiled, "All my life it has been my ambition to finish writing my book but an ambition realised is like a snowflake in a warm hand. Take away my dream and what would I have left?" When he died, his pen was still in his hand, the unfinished manuscript in front of him. It is said he was smiling happily. The story had a moral, it is this: Don't take away people's hopes and dreams. Often they are the most precious and best-loved things in their lives.
