Solzhenistsyn give the following example of fidelity to Jesus. It concerns a ten your old girl whose whole family had been scattered to distant labour camps because of their belief in God. A little girl was taken to an Orphanage, but she refused to give up the cross her Mum had hung around her neck before leaving. She tied a knot so that they could not take it from her during sleep. The struggle went on and on, but it was no good. She would not give up the cross. "You can strangle me and take it from a corpse if you like", she said

to them. She also refused to submit herself to retraining, that is, to the propaganda of

the Party. In the Orphanage she was forced to live with children who were the very dregs of Russian Society. Yet she refused to steal or to curse. They never broke her. She ended up doing ten years in a labour camp. Would you have the same determination to behave in a similar fashion under such awful strain and pressure? May the Lord bless our willingness to remain very close to Jesus especially in times of trials and difficulties.

PRECIOUS INDEED

There is a story told that one day Jesus came upon a Shepherd who was crying his eyes out. "Why are you so sad?" Jesus asked, as He put His hand on the Shepherd's shoulder. "I am so sad", said the Shepherd, "because I have lost one of my sheep". Still crying he continued, "and though I have looked all over for it, I have not found it. It may be that the wolf has already devoured it". Then Jesus said, "Wait here. I will look for the sheep myself". With that He disappeared into the hills. An hour and a half later Jesus returned with the sheep. Putting it down at the Shepherd's feet He said, "From this day on you must love this sheep more than any other in your flock for it was lost and now it has been found". You and I are all the more precious to Jesus because He had to go to the trouble of looking for us and finding us.
